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San Diego Mesa College is a fully accredited, comprehensive institution committed to being the leading college of equity and excellence. As one of the largest community colleges in California, Mesa serves over 30,000 students each year, 30% of whom are first-generation students. The College offers nearly 200 associate degrees and certificate programs, as well as a Bachelor of Science in Health Information Management, one of the first four-year baccalaureate degrees offered by a California community college.

Mesa College is San Diego's top transfer institution and supports 19 athletic teams, consistently among the most successful in the Pacific Coast Athletic Conference. As a proud Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI) and Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander Serving Institution (AANAPISI), Mesa is also a student-parent and military-friendly college, serving more than 4,000 veterans, active-duty service members, and their families.

To support its diverse student population, the College offers a variety of learning and support centers, including the AVANZA Engagement Center, Dreamer Resource Center, Family Resource Center, FAST/ Foster Youth Center, High Tech Center, Honors Center, Kapwa Umoja Puente (KUP) Center, Pride Center, STEM Center, Veterans Center, and The Stand: The Dr. Pamela T. Luster Resource Center, which provides food and clothing assistance.



Mesa College Police hosted Rape Aggression Defense (R.A.D.) classes for students, staff, and faculty. This women-only program combined awareness, prevention, risk reduction, and hands-on self-defense techniques. Taught by nationally certified instructors, the course equipped participants with practical tools to stay safe and empowered both on and off campus.

Wellness Walkabout **Promotes Connection** and Wellbeing

On October 11, Mesa College hosted its first-ever Wellness Walkabout, an event focused on promoting employee wellness, connection, and campus integration. Guided walks began every half hour from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., each led by a special guest, and started at the campus Quad. Faculty and staff were invited to step away from their desks, enjoy fresh air, and connect with colleagues.







National Drug & Alcohol Facts Week at Mesa

Mesa College Student Health Services hosted an interactive exhibit during National Drug & Alcohol Facts Week to educate students on the realities of substance use. Students explored hands-on learning stations, wore impairment goggles, and received free resources such as fentanyl test strips, drink test kits, and Narcan. The event also connected students with campus and community recovery supportall while enjoying a free lunch and earning optional extra credit.

Promoting Safety Through Equity & Access

In October 2024, Mesa College hosted its inaugural Safety Fair, an event focused on empowering our campus community with equitable access to critical safety tools and knowledge.

Held in partnership with first responders, C-CERT, the Great Shakeout, and the San Diego Sheriff's Department, the fair

featured hands-on breathless CPR, self-defense training, and emergency preparedness resources.

By centering community engagement and inclusive safety education, this event supported Mesa's ongoing mission to eliminate barriers and ensure all students and employees feel informed, protected, and valued.

strategies in areas such as recruitment, onboarding, curriculum development, leadership, and communication. It provides structured prompts and best practices to foster cultural responsiveness and inclusive environments across campus.



MOST: Advancing Teaching Excellence at Mesa College

Mesa's Ongoing Support for Teaching (MOST) is a faculty led program that puts equity in action through personalized coaching, workshops, and professional learning cohorts. This year, MOST expanded opportunities for faculty to learn together in supportive communities while also offering just in time coaching and the Teaching Tree resource hub. With a focus on equity minded

and humanizing practices, MOST empowers faculty to design courses that foster belonging and success for all students.



Mesa Supports Assembly Bill 335 to Establish **Grants for Black-Serving Institutions**

San Diego Mesa College proudly supports Assembly Bill 335, part of a series of reparation bills signed by Governor Gavin Newsom in September 2024. Authored by former State Senator Steve Bradford, AB 335 would designate qualifying colleges as Black-Serving Institutions (BSIs), making them eligible for additional funding to support Black student success.

Mesa College has long demonstrated its commitment to this work through programs such as Umoja, the Black Leadership Fellows Program, and the Rising Scholars program. The college has also advocated for the passage of AB 335 through districtwide equity initiatives and statewide coalitions.

This designation establishes an imperative for colleges to dismantle systemic barriers that have restricted access and success.

#RealCollege Curriculum: A Professional Learning Opportunity for Supporting Students Facing Basic Needs Insecurity

San Diego Mesa College is proud to offer the #RealCollege Curriculum's first course, developed by the national nonprofit organization Believe in Students. This resource is designed for faculty and staff committed to addressing basic needs insecurity among students.





The curriculum includes:

- Quick and Easy Access: Simple enrollment process to begin right away
- Free First Course: "The Students We Have" is available at no cost and takes only 90 minutes to complete
- Flexible Learning: Asynchronous modules for self-paced, on-demand learning
- Efficient Training: A guide for driving impactful change across departments
- Practical Application: Strategies and tools to implement immediately to support student success

STAR TRIO Grant **Empowers First-Gen Student Success**

San Diego Mesa College was awarded a \$1.76 million TRIO Student Support Services (SSS) grant from the U.S. Department of Education to support lowincome, first-generation, and disabled students. This funding continues Mesa's STAR TRIO program, which has supported student success since 1977. The program offers academic tutoring,

financial aid guidance, mentoring, and more—helping students stay on track to graduate or transfer. "Everything changed for me when I became part of STAR TRIO," said Spring 2024 graduate Ginger Mankins. "I used the space daily to study, get help from a tutor, and build community. I finished my ADT in under two years and transferred to SDSU."

National Distinction in Access and Impact

San Diego Mesa College has been recognized in the 2025 Carnegie Classifications as a "Mixed Associate Large" institution—an honor held by only 2% of U.S. colleges and universities. This rare classification reflects Mesa's high enrollment, wide range of academic programs, and focus on associate degrees. Additionally, Mesa earned a "Higher Access, Medium Earnings" designation in the new Student Access and Earnings Classification, highlighting our strong service to racially and economically diverse students and identifying areas for continued growth in post-college wage outcomes. These recognitions affirm Mesa's intentional focus on access and equity, reinforcing our mission to support student success at scale. More than a label, these honors serve as a call to action—encouraging us to lead with purpose, advocate for impactful policy, and strategically leverage this recognition to drive innovation, secure resources, and improve long-term student outcomes.





MT2C Earns National Certification

The Mesa Tutoring and Computing Centers (MT2C) was honored as a "Certified Online Tutoring Program" by the Association of Colleges for Tutoring and Learning Assistance (ACTLA). In Spring 2025, MT2C supported 1,169 students through 5,161 free tutoring sessions, both online and in person. Tutors were also embedded in over 60 course sections. Open to all subjects and backgrounds, MT2C's dedicated staff help students build confidence and succeed in their academic journey.

The celebration began with a silent walk to the Rosa Parks Transit Station, where students, faculty, and community members gathered for a program led by Black Studies Professor Thekima Mayasa, President Ashanti Hands and local advocates spoke on Parks' lasting impact and the ongoing fight for equitable public transportation. Mesa's connection to Rosa Parks spans decades, and her spirit continues to inspire collective action for justice.


debate team in the Association's history.


Melissa Chavez Finds Confidence, Community, and a Future at Mesa College


Igniting Student Success

When Angel René walked across the stage at Mesa College in Spring 2025, he celebrated more than academic success; he celebrated resilience, identity, and self-belief. After being forced out of his home and church for being gay, Angel faced more than five years of instability before enrolling at Mesa at age 24. He lived in his car for six months while rebuilding his life and returned to college with determination.

Angel thrived as a student and leader, earning straight As and serving in ASG, Umoja, Phi Theta Kappa, and the Police Advisory Board. He is also a musician, with his album How to Live A Beautiful Life available on major platforms. With mentorship from Mesa professors and a campus rooted in care, Angel found his voice, overcame an eating disorder, and graduated with honors and multiple scholarships. He is headed to Yale University in Fall 2025, proof of what is possible when opportunity meets determination.





Mia Hondojo- Mesa College Valedictorian and **Future Bruin Reflects on Growth, Community,** and the Power of Redirection

After facing college rejections that redirected her path, Mia Hondojo chose San Diego Mesa College, inspired by her sister's positive experience and encouragement. Although she was initially hesitant about attending a community college, Mia soon found the support and opportunities at Mesa that reshaped her perspective.

Mia transitioned from business to biology after discovering her passion for science. A member of the Kapwa learning community, she reconnected with her AAPI identity and credits faculty mentorship and cultural engagement with helping her

thrive. She was active in the Honors Program, Asian Pacific Diversity Club, Outreach, and the AANAPISI grant team, and participated in prestigious internships with Scripps Research, Scripps Health, and the California Medicine Scholars Program at UC San Diego.

Graduating as a valedictorian, Mia will transfer to UCLA to study physiological science. She plans to pursue a career in healthcare, where she hopes to promote diversity and serve others with empathy and innovation.

Advocating for Students Through Policy, Representation, and Support

At the first ever SDCCD town hall hosted by Mesa College, Chancellor Gregory Smith, along with Trustees Marichu Magaña and Mariah Jameson, emphasized their commitment to student advocacy through inclusive policies, representation and support systems. Magaña and Jameson, both with deep ties to Mesa, spoke about the importance of visibility and the use of existing laws and networks to protect against discrimination.

The event highlighted the work of the Pride Center and the

Undocumented Student Center, featuring student testimonials and staff panelists who called for stronger allyship, inclusive language and trauma informed training. Mesa students Angel Aguilar Garcia and Lucio Lira emphasized the need for safe spaces and proactive community engagement. Smith invited feedback and reaffirmed the district's commitment to protecting student resources, stating, "We need to be loud that we exist in opposition to that kind of rhetoric.'



Standing with Undocumented Students: Education, Protection, and Empowerment

In response to growing anxiety surrounding immigration enforcement, Mesa continues to be a strong advocate for undocumented students and their families. Through virtual and multilingual events like Know Your Rights & Emergency Preparedness Workshops for Undocumented Families, hosted in partnership with SDCCD and local nonprofits, community

members learned how to protect themselves and create family safety plans. These workshops offered in English, Spanish, and Haitian Creole—were held on Zoom to ensure accessibility and safety.

Additional efforts included resource-focused events like the Women's Immigration Resource Info Session, which offered critical guidance on navigating immigration systems and connecting with clinics, shelters, and legal aid. Mesa also took proactive steps on campus by posting official policies on immigration enforcement in classroom buildings and distributing informational cards to students and faculty outlining how to assert their rights if approached by law enforcement.

Embracing the Future: Al Integration at Mesa College

Artificial intelligence is rapidly transforming both education and the workforce, and Mesa College is responding. In May 2025, the event AI in the Workforce Part 1: Industry Insights, a collaboration between the Career and Technical Education and LOFT programs, brought together professionals from health care, construction, libraries and computer science to discuss how AI is reshaping their fields. From improving occupational safety to enabling HIPAA compliant personalized care and advancing software innovation, panelists offered real world perspectives and advice on preparing students for the future.



A follow-up event, AI in the Workforce: Innovating Instruction, highlighted how faculty are integrating AI tools into their teaching. With support from the Career Center's workforce training partnerships, Mesa is helping the campus community adapt to an AI integrated society.





Cyber Aware: Strengthening **Digital Safety in** a Changing World

As technology rapidly evolves, so do the risks-and instead

of ignoring the shift, Mesa is preparing students to face it head-on. Cyber Aware, a campus-wide event, brought together by San Diego Community College District's Information Technology team for an engaging day of digital learning. Attendees explored how to avoid scams

and identity theft, spot fake job offers, secure their devices, and protect academic data. Through interactive discussions and networking, the event emphasized that understanding cybersecurity is no longer optional—it's essential in today's connected world.

Champions of Impact



Lucio Lira Recognized with Statewide LGBTQ+ Excellence Award

San Diego Mesa College celebrated Lucio Lira, Counselor Coordinator at the Pride Center. as the 2025 recipient of the Dr. Emilie Mitchell Rainbow Excellence Award, honoring his leadership in creating inclusive, empowering spaces for LGBTQIA+ students. Lucio was recognized for developing affinity spaces and launching the Pride Scholars Learning Cohort, bringing personal experience and empathy to his work. Reflecting on the recognition, Lucio shared that the award reaffirmed the need to show up for LGBTQIA+ students. especially in today's climate.

Mesa College President Dr. Ashanti T. Hands praised Lucio's contributions: "Lucio Lira embodies the heart and soul of Mesa—equity in action, rooted in care. His work ensures our LGBTQIA+ students are not only seen, but celebrated."

Coach Gary Watkins Makes History with Playoff-Bound Olympians

In Fall 2024, San Diego Mesa College Football made history under Head Coach Gary Watkins, who became the first Black head coach to lead a team into the California Community College Athletic Association (3C2A) playoffs since their inception in 2008.

This marked Mesa's first playoff appearance since becoming eligible in 2018. The 8-2 Olympians entered the Southern California Regionals as the No. 3 seed, facing No. 2 seed Riverside City College.



Watkins, in his seventh season at Mesa and sixth as head coach, led with humility and determination, emphasizing team effort over personal recognition. "Mesa's players and staff earned this," Watkins shared.

Athletic Director Ryan Shumaker praised Watkins as a "rockstar football coach" whose leadership has positively impacted the entire college community.

Dr. O'Connor Helps Shape California's **Common Course Numbering and Policy**

Dr. Isabel de Los Angeles O'Connor serves as the President of the California Community Colleges Chief Instructional Officers. As part of that role, she serves on Consultation Council and the League's Advocacy Committee on Legislation. A member of the original Common Course Numbering taskforce representing CIOs, Dr. O'Connor now serves on the four-member Common Course Numbering Steering Committee as well as the Common Course Numbering Council, which provides guidance to the state community colleges on AB1111 implementation.

Carole Thompson Connects Learning to Careers with Becky the Bot

In 2024, Work-Based Learning Instructor Carole Thompson introduced an innovative digital resource—Becky the Bot—to help students confidently navigate their career journeys. Designed as a virtual guide, Becky provides students with curated information including job examples, salary ranges, step-by-step career roadmaps, and links to reputable resources for deeper exploration.

Thompson, who specializes in connecting academic learning with real-world application, developed Becky to extend her mission of preparing students for success beyond the classroom. Through industry partnerships, mentorship, and hands-on experiences, she empowers students to align their education with professional goals—putting equity and opportunity into action. Coach Ricketts Named 5CTCA Coach of the Year, Leads Olympians to Historic Title

Coach Ricketts capped off a remarkable season by being named the 5CTCA Coach of the Year after leading the Mesa College men's cross country team to a dominant state championship. Under Ricketts' leadership, Mesa had three All-Americans finish in the top 11, with

two additional runners placing 16th and 17th to earn All-State honors. The team's sixth runner also placed 26th overall, joining the All-State list. This marks Ricketts' third state men's team title and sixth straight top-three team finish.

Beach Volleyball Head Coach Kim Lester has been named the 2025 Pacific Coast Athletic Conference (PCAC) All-Sports Coach of the Year

Beach Volleyball Head Coach Kim Lester was named the 2025 Pacific Coast Athletic Conference (PCAC) All-Sports Coach of the Year, marking her second time receiving the honor. She first earned the distinction in 2004.

Under Lester's leadership, the Olympians delivered a historic season. The team won its fourth consecutive PCAC conference championship and concluded the year by capturing the 2025 CCCAA State Title. Lester also coached standout pair Jaiden Mojica and Myah Gomez to a third-place finish at the 2025 CCCAA State Pairs Championships.



Pathways and Partnerships



Mesa Reaffirms its Partnership with **National University**

San Diego Mesa College proudly raised the National University partnership flag as a symbol of our shared commitment to student success. This growing collaboration supports Mesa students with direct, flexible, and affordable transfer pathways to bachelor's degrees.

Highlights of the partnership include:

- 46% tuition scholarship for Mesa students with an AA-T or AS-T
- Reduced tuition to \$880 per course
- Accelerated completion in 90 quarter units or less
- Scholarships for Mesa employees: 25% off most programs, 15% for doctoral degrees





Junior Achievement Interns

In summer 2025, seven high school students were welcomed to Mesa College as part of the Junior Achievement program. During the month long experience, students received hands-on training and professional development through workshops and job shadowing in departments including Outreach, Facilities, Student Affairs, EOPS and the Learning Resource Center. They also explored certificate programs such as Allied Health and engaged with the San Diego Community College District Police Department.

The program gives students exposure to diverse career pathways beyond traditional roles in higher education. Mesa College President Dr. Ashanti Hands reflected on her own experience with Junior Achievement, sharing, "Those early lessons in leadership, budgeting and teamwork helped shape my future. Today, I use those same skills as a college president. That's the power of programs like this."









First ever CSUSM Day **Builds Transfer Pathways and Collaboration**

In Spring 2025, Mesa College welcomed the California State University San Marcos community for the inaugural CSUSM Day, a campuswide partnership event designed to strengthen transfer pathways and crossinstitutional collaboration. More than 30 CSUSM departments and programs were represented, including Admissions, Housing, Financial Aid, EOP, Veteran Services and New Student and Family Programs.

For the first time, all four CSUSM colleges came together for a Mesa-exclusive event, offering students direct access to faculty, academic departments and student support teams. Representatives also visited classrooms and engaged in meaningful dialogue with Mesa students, staff and faculty.

Pathways and Partnerships









This year, San Diego Mesa College proudly hosted the inaugural San Diego County stop of the statewide CCC to HBCU Transfer Caravan, becoming the first destination on the tour. The event brought representatives from Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) across the country to campus, providing students with direct access to transfer information, scholarship opportunities, and on-the-spot admissions.

California community college students with a GPA of 2.0 or higher who meet specific requirements are guaranteed admission to participating HBCU institutions—offering a powerful pathway for students to continue their education in culturally affirming environments.



Expanding Emergency Aid for Student Success

In partnership with the Educational Credit Management Corporation (ECMC), the Project Success Emergency Aid Program has been renewed with \$10,000 in funding for the upcoming academic year. This initiative provides students facing urgent, unexpected financial hardships with up to \$500 in emergency support. Since launching, the program has distributed \$50,000 to assist 111 students, helping them stay on track academically. The renewed funding will allow Mesa to continue supporting students in crisis.

- Online Financial Literacy resources to build money management skills
- Loan Repayment & Default Support
- The VitaNavis platform to connect students' interests with academic and career goals







Mesa at the Heart of Downtown's Civic Renewal

San Diego Mesa College is proud to be part of a visionary effort to transform Downtown San Diego's Civic Center into a vibrant cultural and educational hub. Led by the Downtown San Diego Partnership, Prebys Foundation, U3 Advisors, and the San Diego Community College District, the concept includes a proposed World Art Museum & Research Center inspired by Mesa's renewed World Art Collection, under the leadership of Dr. Denise Rogers. Still in its early stages, the project imagines dynamic educational spaces that could support Mesa's Museum Studies, Art History, and related programs. This collaboration highlights Mesa's commitment to equity, access, and innovation—positioning the college and its students at the center of an emerging urban cultural district.

Impactship and Research Opportunities







Mesa Impactship Program Hosts First Inaugural Internship Expo

In Fall 2024, the Mesa Impactship Program (MIP) hosted its firstever MIP Internship Expo, bringing together more than 25 employers from a wide range of industries to connect with Mesa College students. Held in the Mesa Quad, the event offered students valuable face time with professionals, internship opportunities, and hands-on career readiness support.

The Expo exemplified MIP's mission to support underserved student populations by providing equitable access to internships, workforce training, and financial support. Students received onthe-spot resume tips, interview prep, and guidance on applying for MIP funding—up to \$1,000 or hourly compensation through Work Experience or Directed Clinical Practice (DCP).





Hire Up Program Launches to Support System-Impacted Students

Launched in Fall 2024, the Hire Up program at San Diego Mesa College provides targeted financial support to students who are former foster youth, CalWORKs recipients, or were formerly incarcerated.

Designed to reduce economic barriers, the program offers monthly stipends of up to

\$2,720—calculated by enrollment level and unmet financial needto help cover college-related expenses. To qualify, students must be enrolled at least halftime, have a current FAFSA/ CADAA on file, and be in good academic standing. Participants must also be actively involved in the Rising Scholars Network. Hire Up exemplifies Mesa's

ongoing commitment to equity by supporting system-impacted populations and helping them stay on track with their academic goals. The program also aims to address socioeconomic disparities by equipping students with the tools and training needed to reenter the workforce and achieve self-sufficiency.

Impactship and Research Opportunities

The CADRE (CreAting Dedicated Scientists through Research Education) program, a collaboration between the Mesa Impactship Program (MIP) and UC San Diego's Altman Clinical and Translational Research Institute (ACTRI), continues to transform student pathways in science.







From Numbers to Public Health: **Luna Reves Finds Her Calling**

Luna Glenn Reyes, a Mesa College alum and firstgeneration college student, found her path to public health through the CADRE internship program. Originally from Mexico, Reyes discovered a love for math early on and later connected it to health equity through biostatistics. As a 2024 CADRE intern, she worked in Dr. Lindsey Burnett's UC San Diego lab studying pelvic floor disorders—gaining hands-on lab experience and analyzing patient referral data with a focus on disparities affecting Latinx communities. She also co-created a scientific poster presented at a national conference and is now collaborating on a follow-up study and research paper. Reyes, who transferred to UC San Diego in Fall 2024 to study Global Health, says the CADRE program eased her transition to the university and helped her find a sense of belonging.

From Mesa Classrooms to **UC San Diego Labs:** Alec Guerra

Mesa College student Alec Guerra joined the CADRE Program in 2024 with a passion for medicine and a goal of becoming a radiologist. He sought hands-on research experience and found it through CADRE's partnership with UC San Diego. Under the mentorship of Dr. Sara Gianella Weibel, Alec worked in a lab focused on HIV research—organizing tissue samples, extracting DNA, and even participating in a rare autopsy as part of the Last Gift study. What began as a resumebuilding internship turned into a transformative experience. Alec impressed his mentors with his work ethic and curiosity, ultimately earning a part-time role at the lab. "It's been great to actually go to work every day and genuinely look forward to what I'm going to be doing," he said. Alec plans to transfer to UC San Diego and continue his journey to medical school.

From Refugee to Researcher: Oleksandr Sharlai's **Path Through CADRE**

A refugee from Ukraine and a biology major at Mesa College, Oleksandr Sharlai joined the CADRE Program to pursue a future in neuroscience and psychiatry. After arriving in San Diego, he began rebuilding his life and found purpose in mental health advocacy and research. Through CADRE, Oleksandr interned in Dr. Christine Smith's cognitive neuroscience lab at UC San Diego, where he developed memory assessment questions tied to major news events and observed MRI sessions, neuropsychological testing, and even a human brain dissection. The partnership gave him deeper insight into memory disorders and the ethical dimensions of research. Now continuing his work at Scripps Research, Oleksandr studies PTSD and brain function while also serving on the national Young Leaders Council with Mental Health America.

Mesa's Men's and Women's cross country team dominated the 3C2A State Championships, capturing both the men's and women's state titles in a historic sweep. "I put my cap and gown on over my track uniform during the car ride," he recalls with a smile. "Walking across that stage meant the world, because of all the hard work it took to get there."

From student-athlete to NFL coach, his journey is a testament to the determination, balance, and community fostered at San Diego Mesa College — and a reminder to current students that their dreams are within reach.


