A MESSAGE FROM
President Hands

Welcome to Spring 2026! I am excited to welcome our students, classified professionals, faculty, and administrators, both those returning and those joining Mesa College for the first time. Each new term brings renewed energy, possibility, and purpose.

There is much to celebrate. From our continued enrollment momentum to our designation as a Black Serving Institution and our advancing conversations around the World Arts Gallery as an anchor for downtown revitalization, Mesa College is living into its mission in powerful ways, reflecting the power of education, culture, and creativity to strengthen communities and create shared civic spaces rooted in learning and belonging. At the same time, we are entering this semester amid a world that feels complex, unsettled, and at times overwhelming. The broader social, political, and economic landscape can feel heavy, especially for those of us who serve students every day.

Many of us are carrying deep emotions. Anger, sorrow, grief, and the feeling that no matter how much we do, it may not feel like enough. We are navigating a moment marked by misinformation, fury, violence, and profound fear, particularly within immigrant communities. This pain and fear are not abstract. In 2026 alone, at least eight people have either been killed by federal agents or have died while in the custody of Immigration and Customs Enforcement. I want to acknowledge clearly that I, along with the Chancellor and District, am aware of the concerns being raised across our community regarding ICE and the fear this creates, including questions about safety and enforcement on and around our campus.

It is precisely in moments like these that clarity matters most. Clarity does not minimize pain, but it gives us direction. Clarity reminds us who we are, what we stand for, and how we respond with integrity rather than reaction. As a college, we have a plan in place to support our community. I encourage everyone to review the information shared below and to make use of the wealth of guidance, resources, and support available through our Dreamer Center.

What we carry as community college practitioners is not simply a burden. It is a profound responsibility and an opportunity. We are entrusted with supporting students who are navigating uncertainty, ambition, struggle, and hope all

at once. That responsibility calls us to lead with care, courage, and conviction, for our students, for one another, and for our community.

Maya Angelou once reminded us that when we are grounded in what is right, we do not have to overthink our actions. We act with integrity because our values guide us. At Mesa College, it is essential that we continue to name and recommit to what we stand for, especially in moments of disruption or possibility. When the path feels unclear, our values become our compass.

In times like these, it is tempting to seek certainty, yet certainty can create a false sense of security. What our students and our institution need most is clarity. Clarity about who we are. Clarity about what we value. Clarity about how we show up for one another. My commitment is to lead with that clarity and with an unwavering dedication to equity, excellence, belonging, and student success, not only on campus but in the spaces where decisions are made about our collective future.

Earlier this week, I had the opportunity to attend the CCLC 2026 Legislative Conference in Sacramento. This trip was centered on advocacy, and I continue to be in awe of the SDICCCA region's collective efforts. Trustees, CEOs, and student leaders came together to engage in meaningful conversations with elected officials around issues that directly impact Mesa students and communities across California, including community college baccalaureate degrees, enrollment growth, COLA across all categorical programs, the Student Centered Funding Formula, deferred maintenance, and the restoration of the sixty million dollars in Strong Workforce funding.

I am especially proud of San Diego Mesa College Associated Student President Jeremiah and the Pride Centers' Sage Shevkolenko for representing our college with passion, courage, and purpose. Their leadership was a powerful reminder that advocacy is strongest when it is inclusive, student-centered, and grounded in shared values.

As we begin this semester together, I invite us all to recommit to the work before us. Let us meet this moment with intention, compassion, and shared resolve. Let us continue to show up for our students and our community, rooted in purpose, grounded in equity, and growing together.

If approached by immigration officials, you may respond: "I am not authorized to speak with you, answer your questions, or provide access to any people or facilities per SDCCD policy. San Diego Mesa College has a clear, coordinated Immigration Enforcement Response Plan centered on our Emergency Management Response Team, led by the President and including College Communications, Vice Presidents, Facilities and Operations, OEHS, and the Campus Community Emergency Response Team, in coordination with SDCCD Police. Recognizing that every incident is unique, this structure ensures we are prepared to act quickly and compassionately with clear communication, coordinated safety measures, and robust support for students and employees should an incident occur.

ENCOURAGE students to remain in their classroom or a private office of a trusted individual (if ICE is nearby).

WITNESS

Stand by as a witness, if you feel comfortable doing so. You are legally entitled to use your cellphone to record enforcement activities as long as you do not directly interfere. Share video with your college information officer.

4.

RESPOND IF ASKED

"I am not authorized to speak with you, answer your questions, or provide access to any people or facilities per SDCCD policy. Only the District Chancellor and General Counsel have authority to assist you. You may contact the Chancellor or General Counsel at: 3375 Camino del Rio South, Suite 300 or 330 San Diego, CA 92108, (619) 388-6957 or (619) 388-6589."

- Do not give consent for them to enter facilities.
- Do not physically interfere with an officer and step aside if directed to.

Dr. Gina Ann Garcia is a professor in the School of Education at UC Berkeley. Her research centers on issues of equity and justice in higher education with an emphasis on understanding how Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSIs) embrace an organizational identity for serving minoritized populations. She explores how HSIs transform their organizational structures to create a culture that values the lived realities of people of color and investigates the processes and practices that enhance the outcomes and experiences of students attending these institutions.

Dr. Garcia is a public scholar who translates theoretical ideas into tangible actions in practice. She is the author of *Becoming Hispanic-Serving Institutions: Opportunities for Colleges & Universities* and *Transforming Hispanic Serving Institutions for Equity and Justice*. She is also the editor of the book *Hispanic-Serving Institutions in Practice: Defining "Servingness" at HSIs* and co-authored the workbook *Transforming HSIs for Equity and Justice: A Practitioner's Workbook*.

She has delivered over 200 public lectures and workshops across the country and consults directly with HSIs to work towards organizational transformation. She is also the host of the popular podcast *¿Qué pasa, HSIs?*

Enrollment Update

Students have their sights set on Spring 2026 with another week of increased enrollment. Last week we saw a jump of 1,254 students registering for Spring classes, and this week that jump is 750 more students to bring us to a headcount of 20,500 students. Our FTES is now 5,856 which exceeds our Spring 2026 goals, as of now. While this is not our official number, enrollment will adjust over the next 4 weeks as students move their schedules around, as we address any lingering bots, and as we potentially expand offerings in the second eight-week session. Compared to the week before the start of Spring 2025, we were at a similar headcount of 20,437 and our FTES was 5,906.

IE Office Hours – A Dedicated Time to Think Through Your Data Together

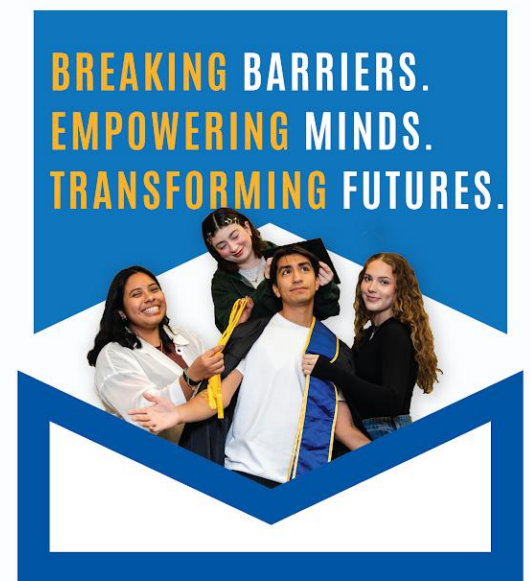
